Free Virtual PD for Teachers on Climate Change



Time for Students to Apply for Emperor Science Awards

Students interested in a career in science and cancer research can apply for the Emperor Science Award. The program offers students in grades 10 and 11 an opportunity to build mentor relationships and work on a cancer research project with a professional scientist. One hundred students across the U.S. will be selected. Three North Texas students won last year. **Students must apply by November 1.**

Stream Performers, Scientists and Other Pros into Your Classroom

Connect2Texas provides access to experts and learning experiences through live streaming and videoconferencing. Program examples include live performances, authors, science experiments, discussions of museum exhibits and virtual field trips. Some events have a charge but many are free, including two on Friday, September 15: "The Constitution at Work" sessions for elementary and middle schools from the National Archives. Providers include Bass Performance Hall, the Bullock Texas State History Museum in Austin, McDonald Observatory, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and many more.



Registration is required and many programs are repeated. (Check the "Events" tab.) Some programs are recorded and archived for viewing at any time. The service, from Region 11 Education Service Center, is open to any school anywhere.
